

Synopsis: In the midst of family tensions, an egocentric free spirit who hits rock bottom finds unexpected success as a self-empowerment guru after publishing a self-help book.

**Directors Statement:** While living your life, you may have noticed a common theme. Through all the ups and

downs, the curveballs, the calms before the storm, and the subsequent storms, you are always present. If you follow the teachings in Dr. Margaret Schultz's seminal work I Like Me, you might think that the key to smoothing out life's rollercoaster and setting out a pathway for achieving success simply means looking deep into yourself and realizing you are great, and asking yourself why. Our film is about our heroic character's journey to find out that why. Remember, I like me and I am great, and so can you!

About the Director: James originally received acting training at the University of Victoria and the American Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York. As a performer he has appeared in stage plays across North America. including The Merchant of Venice, The Comedy of Errors, Hamlet, A View from the Bridge, The Mail Order Bride, The Marowitz Hamlet, Electra, Ion and the Fred Wells Show. Over the past two decades James has produced or co-produced a number of noteworthy theatre projects, including the national touring premiere of Daniel McIvor's Never Swim Alone on the Canadian Fringe Festival circuit. James's recent directing credits include The Saints of British Rock, The Bride of Barkerville, Lady Overlander, The Great Love of Queen Victoria, The Sinister Secret of Hatley Castle, Fangs for the Memories, and Das Love Boot. He has also worked as dramaturge on critically-lauded productions of Andrew Hamilton's Kaliban, Sally Clark's Wanted, and Anne Carson's contemporary translation of Sophocles' Electra.

Synopsis: Two childhood friends reunite in their sleepy hometown as they each face a crossroads in their lives. As an editor, Ben has taken on director and producer roles, directing and producing, among other things, music videos for Jimmie Van Zant of the Lynyrd Skynyrd family, documentaries and TV show pilots, and specials and internet videos for internationally touring comedians. When Ben is not doing all that, he produces/edits for The Great Courses and follows in his father's footsteps as a photographer.

Synopsis: Sanity and relationships are put to the test when mysterious circumstances force a family to survive the annual American Thanksgiving holiday without their cell phones.

**About the Director:** Search Engines is Russell Brown's fourth narrative feature. His

third feature film, Annie and the Gypsy, starring Cybill Shepherd, premiered at the Seattle Film Festival in June, 2012. Osiris Entertainment distributed the film in Spring, 2013. Russell is a member of the Writer's Guild of America and is a Film Independent Producing Fellow. His films are held as part of the collection at the UCLA Film and Television archive. Synopsis: An intimate look at the world's obsession with Herman Melville's Moby-Dick; the "Great America Novel. In this film, historians, artists and philosophers, and fanatics explore the novel's artistic and cultural legacy and the impact it has had throughout America's history. In Call Us Ishmael, filmmaker David Shaerf, takes us on a journey to meet these enthusiasts as they reveal their personal fascination with Captain Ahab and the most famous whale of all time. The film will show us how the novel has affected not only their lives, but also created a community of people who have been brought together by the power of Melville's masterwork, Moby-Dick.

About the Director: David Shaerf works and lives in Detroit. He is a professor at Oakland University where he teaches film and screenwriting. He wrote and directed theatre in Wellington, New Zealand. He lived in Italy for two years teaching English. He then moved to the United Kingdom to do his PhD. at the University of Exeter. He read Moby-Dick after grad school and his life was never the same. His first feature A Love for the Game is about professional backgammon players.

# The Perfect Bid // 72minutes

Director: CJ Wallis May 18th • 8:30 pm Comstock Park



Synopsis: Ted Slauson is a math teacher from Texas who spent the majority of his life memorizing the prize amounts on The Price Is Right. The film explores how Ted went from bidding to banned, involved in a Perfect Bid

scandal that was covered in Esquire, Time Magazine & others. This year marks the 25th Anniversary of Ted's most famous appearance on the show.

About the Director: After 15 years as a hockey goaltender at professional & national levels, CJ Wallis left to pursue a career as a filmmaker. Wallis volunteered as a director's assistant for 4 years alongside director Scott Smith on his debut award-winning debut feature Rollercoaster While volunteering at the local Rogers Community, filming and directing live events, town hall meetings and studio television shows. Wallis entered and won a handful of local Fast Film competitions. Wallis created over 50 music videos, 75 album covers and 12 hours of lifestyle documentaries in close to 5 years collaborating with Jet Life & some of the biggest names in music. Atlantic Records named Wallis 'Creative Director' for CurrenSv's major studio album Canal Street Confidential in 2015. Wallis currently resides in Vancouver, British Columbia designing & marketing for Jet Life and beginning pre-production on his second feature film Umerica.

# Welcome to Unity // 95 minutes

**Director: Katharine Mahalic** May 19th • 12:00 pm

Armory Event Center



Synopsis: Imagine how crazy things may get when you put seven exchange students, including two kids from Muslim backgrounds, into a Christian home in rural America. Literally filmed by a group of exchange students and local American teens, this documentary captures these exchange students learning

to live the 'American Way' as they sink their teeth into rural Oregon, and become the stars of their high school football team. A lighthearted, teen angst film that voyeuristically illustrates that adolescence is a universal experience.

About the Director: Katharine Mahalic grew up outside of beautiful and sunny Flint, Michigan. She has directed and produced several short awardwinning films, in both fiction and documentary formats. Mahalic finished her undergraduate degree at Michigan State University, majoring in liberal arts. After working in Los Angeles as a stage manager at Channel One News, as well as a freelance script supervisor and production manager, she moved to Chicago to work on her Masters Degree. She obtained her Masters in Fine Arts in Film and Video in 2009 from Columbia College Chicago. Mahalic taught in the film department at the college between 2006-2009. At present, Mahalic is working to develop a film program to serve under-privileged kids in and outside of the United States. She also continues to tour with "Welcome To Unity" and her short film "The Vacuum Kid", a successful documentary about a 12-year-old boy that collects vacuum cleaners.

# Amereki Kum, Escape From Dubai // 89 minutes

Director: Matt Johanning

May 19th • 3:00 pm // Armory Event Center



**Synopsis:** A true story of Chicago CPA, Ted Van Der Zalm, who escaped from the middle east by mailing himself to Amsterdam in a wooden crate. In the late 1980's Ted was offered a once in a lifetime opportunity to join a real estate development team with plans to build an all inclusive resort in Belize. The belief among investors was that Belize was destined to be the next vacation hot spot; the next Cancun. His role was to pitch the project to wealthy individuals and secure financing for the project. Eventually the search for financing led the team to open an office in Dubai. This is where the plan unraveled. In the end Ted was left with the option of spending the rest of his days in and out of a Dubai jail or finding a way to escape from the country.

**About the Director:** The majority of my film experience is with television commercials and in short form documentary work, with this being his first feature film. Matt Johanning currently lives in Philadelphia, PA.

# The United States of Detroit // 66 minutes

Synopsis: Residents of Detroit's neighborhoods fight for survival in a city with an uncertain future, working tirelessly to improve their communities in the face of blight, broken infrastructure and mismanaged resources. Against the odds, Detroiters are able to activate the power of community, use it to take back their blocks, and ultimately regain their future.

About the Director: Tylor Norwood is Owner and Director of SkyDojo Media, a production company that produces documentaries and documentary style content for global commercial campaigns. Having directed commercial work for Google, Facebook, GE Digital and others, he has worked as a cinematographer on documentaries like HBO's Toxic Hot Seat and Sundance selections Paper Tigers and Resilience. In his debut feature "The United States of Detroit" Tylor and co-producer Dana Schwartz hone in on a group of people in Detroit who are actively reshaping the realities of their own communities through action. Tylor's passion for documentary film is guided by his interest in communities who shape their own reality. The resilient nature of people and the microcosm of worlds they live in is what drives him to keep telling stories, and he's excited by the power that documentaries have to make real change--especially where it's needed most.

"Rikishis", these Japanese athletes considered godlike. The identification is instantaneous. The journey begins...

About the Director: In 2008, Julien get a Master degree in cinematographic studies at University of Montreal, and next year a Master 2 in cinematographic research at University of Rennes. In 2010, he follows studies at University of technology Sydney (English studies) and in 2011 he obtains a Master 2 professional in Screenplay, filmmaking, production at University of Paris. Since 2007, he has directed many shorts of fiction and documentaries. In 2016, he writes and shoots Rikishi, produced by Topshot Films and Popiul.

# Hold My Horse // 8 minutes

Director: Timothy Troy

Synopsis: Prone to dressing in civilian clothes when not on duty, Civil War General Israel Richardson decides to teach a lesson to an arrogant young lieutenant tasked with delivering him a message.

About the Director: Troy was born and raised in Chicago. on the South Side of the city, the oldest of two brothers. He has had a love of film and storytelling for his entire life. He graduated from Columbia College Chicago in 2005. He has been working in the film industry, usually within the lighting and camera department, ever since. He's worked on projects ranging from the smallest of the small, to major productions like Jupiter Ascendingl and Chicago PD, all the while finding ways to follow his dream of directing.

# Jump // 3 minutes

Director: J. Van Auken // May 19th • 6:00 pm



Synopsis: JUMP is a short film exploring the year before the world ends, and how we each react to the absence of a tomorrow. The story is told through the eyes of a child unaware that her future has been decided, and unwilling to give up hope.



About the Director: J. began his career in Chicago while attending Columbia College. In 2011, he moved to Los Angeles, continuing to work as a cinematographer and colorist. He released his first feature, REVELATOR, in theaters in 2017 and continues to direct. J. also records music under an alias.

# **Freezer** // 17 minutes Director: Dimitris Nakos

Synopsis: Tassos, a man just over 50 years old, with a career in the marketing and commercial direction of large corporations, has been unemployed for three years now. Too old for a new beginning, but also too young to resign. His relationships with his close people

About the Director: Dimitris Nakos was born in Athens in 1982 and is PhD in cinema and philosophy and is a graduate of National University of Athens and Panteion University of Athens. He is living and working in Athens as director and scriptwriter. He is also teaching cinema in Panteion University Athens.

**Synopsis:** A tenacious middle school band student selling fundraisers helps a grief stricken military family recover from their loss.

**About the Director:** Cathrine Hatcher has been working in the industry for 28 years. Cathrine started out as a Makeup Artist/

She has had the opportunity to prep for camera and make-up people such as Steven Spielberg, Tom Hanks, Matt Damon, Jay Leno, Gary Sinise, Terry Bradshaw, Tony Romo, Emmitt Smith, Magic Johnson, Troy Aikman, and the list goes on. She has worked on hundreds of commercials and industrials and over 100 films and TV shows. Cathrine has touched thousands of faces.

# Stay Woke // 25 minutes

Director: Langston A. Williams

**Synopsis:** On the eve of an election, the lives of a politician trying to reconnect with the people he once represented, two African American youth frustrated by a recent police killing, and a police officer who desires to do the right thing will all collide.

**About the Director:** Langston A. Williams is a recent graduate of the University of New Orleans film program hailing from Gulfport, Mississippi. For undergrad, he received a dual degree in Theatre Arts and Mass Communications with a focus in Broadcast from Southern University and A & M College in Baton Rouge, LA, and he minored in Speech Communications through Louisiana State University in Baton

Rouge, LA. Now a resident of New Orleans, Louisiana, Langston Williams makes films and writes screenplays that address social issues of relevance in the community. He draws inspiration from the works of Spike Lee and Ryan Coogler.

# **'63 Boycott** // 31 minutes **Director: Gordon Quinn** May 19th • 12:00 pm



Synopsis: On October 22, 1963, more than 250,000 students boycotted the Chicago Public Schools to protest racial segregation. Many marched through the city calling for the resignation of School Superintendent Benjamin Willis,

who placed trailers, dubbed 'Willis Wagons,' on playgrounds and parking lots of overcrowded black schools rather than let them enroll in nearby white schools. Combining unseen archival 16mm footage of the march shot by Kartemquin founder Gordon Quinn with the participants' reflections today, '63 Boycott connects the forgotten story of one of the largest northern civil rights demonstrations to contemporary issues around race, education, school closings, and youth activism.

**About the Director:** Artistic Director and founding member of Kartemquin Films, Gordon Quinn has been making documentaries for over 50 years. Roger Ebert, of the Chicago Sun Times, called his first film Home for Life (1966) "an extraordinarily moving documentary." With Home for Life Gordon established the direction he would take for the next four decades, making cinema vérité films that investigate and critique society by documenting the unfolding lives of real people.

# Clark Park // 34 minutes Director: Troy Anderson

May 19th • 12:50 pm



ARK PARB Synopsis: Detroit is known Hockeytown. When the city had to close many of its recreation centers in the early 1990's the once abundant outdoor ice rinks disappeared with them. Except for one. Clark Park is the story of the Southwest Detroit community that

This film examines how the death of Damon Grimes has changed a space, a family, and a community.


